## Keeping the Story Alive.... By Katie Amundsen

#### September 22, 1944...

Since childhood we heard the story of the tragic fateful day when our families left Liebling, not knowing that their lives would change forever. We saw the sadness on our Grandparents' faces as we listened to their voices filled with loss, and we became heartbroken, too. On this the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of this momentous day, it is fitting to remember the events of when our people lost their home and way of life. In 1944, at the end of a beautiful summer, Liebling had a bumper crop in its fields, but life was hard. More Lieblingers were reported killed at the front. Taxes were high, money was tight, and food more scarce. 600 men were serving in the German or Romanian army, leaving the women, old men, children and the school teachers to work Liebling's large fields. They were joined by 750 Russian refugees from Odessa who had fled and arrived in Liebling by train. All of Liebling worked 7 days a week, 16 hours a day, yet the work was far behind schedule. Combined with worry over the future and their loved ones in the war, the people were emotionally and physically exhausted.

On August 23, 1944, Romania switched its alliance, declared war on Germany, and formally sided with Russia and the Allies. For Germans in Romania this was a fateful event. Russian POWs were freed and arriving in Liebling were met with machine gun fire from a handful of German troops. Three Russians were killed on Main Street, Partisans shot at Lieblinger workers in the fields. The gendarmes confiscated bicycles and radios, telephone lines were cut, and newspapers no longer came from Temeschwar. With no outside communication, Liebling was cut off from the world. At midnight of September 17, a Lieblinger rode his horse to Schag, south of Temeschwar, to successfully persuade 40 German troops to return to Liebling. They did, and were able to defend attacks on Liebling for five days.

The night of September 21, was an eerily quiet night, but the next day shortly before noon, Romanian and Russian troops fired from the east into Liebling and were met with German machine gun fire. A loud battle ensued for 2 hours. When it stopped, the German military told the town to flee for three days and after that battle, they could return home. All needed to escape by 6 p.m. Many old people decided to stay to care for the animals, others stayed because they needed to work the fields. In panic and fear, wagons were packed and began leaving at 3 o'clock. Three hours later, the last wagons left. A caravan with 447 wagons and 898 horses carried 2,158 tearful Lieblingers into the darkening night. The church bells chimed their farewell for three hours and when a light drizzle began, it was said that Liebling was shedding its tears.
